 - Make recommendations to improve reporting on cholera patients and deaths
 - Review existing data for children with cholera
 - Present newly developed clinical job aids / tools and identify gaps

- Improving access to cholera treatment in the community – decentralizing treatment and improving community integration
 - Review current practices to decentralize treatment of cholera in the community
